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SOLUTIONS TO EXERCISES CHAPTER 1 1.2.0. a) False. Let $a = 2=3$, $b = 1$, $c = i2$, and $d = i1$. b) False. Let $a = i4$, $b = i1$, and $c = 2$. c) True. Since $a \cdot b$ and $b \cdot a+c$, $|a|b| = |b|a \cdot a+|c|a = c$. d) True. No $a \in \mathbb{R}$ satisfies $a < b^2$ for all $b > 0$, so the inequality is vacuously satisfied. If you want a more constructive proof, if $b \neq 0$ then $a < b^2 < 0+0 = 0$.

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Analysis I (18.100) in its various versions covers fundamentals of mathematical analysis: continuity, differentiability, some form of the Riemann integral, sequences and series of numbers and functions, uniform convergence with applications to interchange of limit operations, some point-set topology, including some work in Euclidean n-space.

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Solution: $a+(-1)a = 1+a+(-1)a = (1+(-1))a = 0$, because of the definition of 1 and -1 and distributivity. Therefore the uniqueness of the additive inverse implies $(-1)a = -a$. $=+(-a)(-b) = ((-1)a)((-1)b)$, which further equals $((-1) \cdot (-1))ab$ because associativity of multiplication. and commutativity.

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
