However, the fatality, in-patient hospitalization, amputation, or loss of an eye must be recorded on your OSHA injury and illness records, if you are required to keep such records. 1904.39(b)(4)

1904.39 - Reporting fatalities, hospitalizations ...

Only fatalities occurring within 30 days of the work-related incident must be reported to OSHA. Further, for an in-patient hospitalization, amputation or loss of an eye, these incidents must be reported to OSHA only if they occur within 24 hours of the work-related incident. Any form of removal of foreign bodies embedded in the eye is considered medical treatment for recordkeeping purposes, as is stated on page 43 of the Recordkeeping Guidelines for Occupational Injuries and Illnesses. This would include any technique to remove rust ring from the cornea.

Every nonexempt employer who is required to keep OSHA records must prepare an annual summary for each establishment based on the information contained in the log for each establishment.
